Responsibility

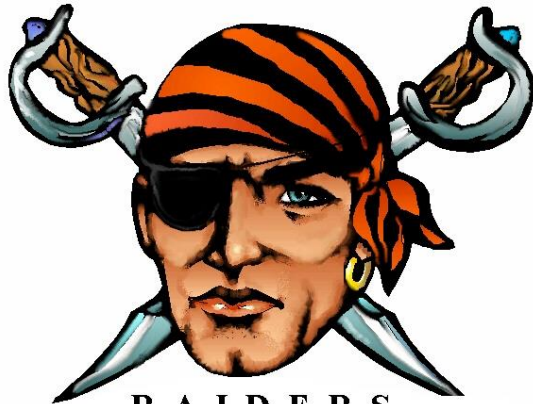
Be dependable and hold yourself accountable. Develop a strong work ethic and be perseverant.

Tips from Ryle Students to the Class of 2022

Frequently Asked Questions

When do I get my schedule and can I walk my schedule before school starts?

Incoming freshmen schedules will be available on August 7, between 2 and 5 pm at Ryle. It is suggested that you DO walk your schedule and get an idea of where your classes are in the building on this day.

What if I get my schedule and I want to change it?

Our master schedule is created based upon student requests made in February during our scheduling window. Because of this, it is difficult to change requested classes unless in emergency situations. Counselors will be available on August 7th during schedule pick-up.

Where is my locker and will I have enough time in between classes to get to it?

Lockers are assigned based upon your homeroom/RAP class. Most locker assignments will be near your homeroom on your schedule. You will have five minutes in between each class.

What is the Raider Achievement Program (RAP) and how does it work?

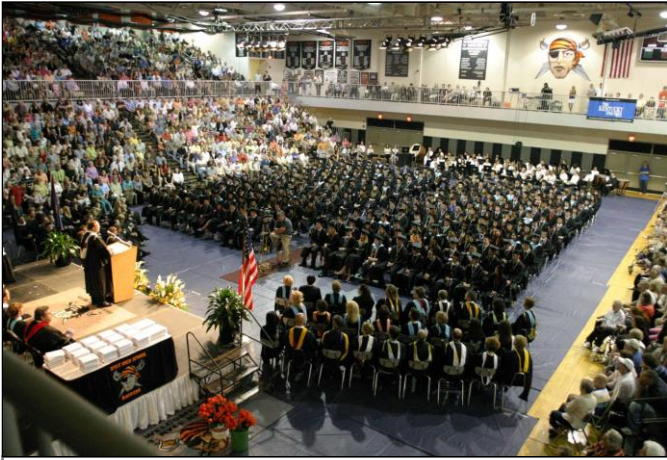
RAP is a 35 minute remediation period that occurs after 3rd period every Tues. – Fri. The purpose is to provide support and enrichment for students. Students sign up for RAP using an online system. It is highly recommended to seek support during this time.

How is high school different than middle school?

In high school you must earn a certain number of specific credits to move on to the next grade level. Additionally, while we will always support you, administrators and teachers promote a higher degree of independence and self-advocacy for students.

Commitment to Service

1. Enacted in the 2007-08 school year, each student is required to complete 5 hours of community service for each academic year.
2. All community service hours are outside of the normal school day. Hours used for other clubs/organization may also be counted for the community service requirement.
3. The students must have a Service Card completed by the person in charge of the community service opportunity and returned to appropriate support staff. These cards are found in the main office.
4. Community service hours are part of the requirements of the Senior Exit Project. A student who does not complete the necessary hours would jeopardize their passing of the senior exit project.
5. A graduating senior is required to have completed 20 total hours of community service. (Recommended: 5 hrs. each year).
