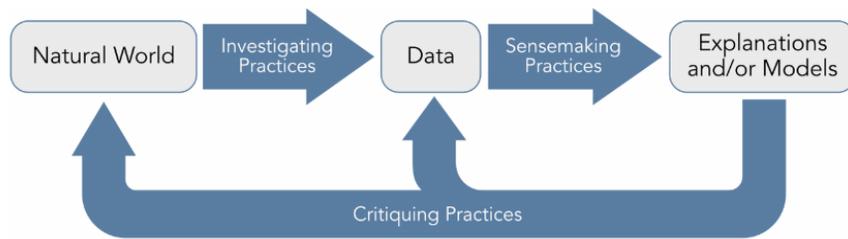

Unit/Core Idea: Interdependent Relationships in Ecosystems

Essential Question: How and why do organisms interact with their environment and what are the effects of these interactions?

Supporting Questions:

- How do matter and energy move through an ecosystem?
- How do organisms interact with living and nonliving environments to obtain matter and energy?
- What happens to ecosystems when the environment changes?
- How does the environment influence populations of organisms over multiple generations?

Science and Engineering Practices (Priority)

Developing and Using Models

Modeling in K–2 builds on prior experiences and progresses to include using and developing models (i.e., diagram, drawing, physical replica, diorama, dramatization, or storyboard) that represent concrete events or design solutions.

- Develop a simple model based on evidence to represent a proposed object or tool. (2-LS2-2)

Planning and Carrying Out Investigations

Planning and carrying out investigations to answer questions or test solutions to problems in K–2 builds on prior experiences and progresses to simple investigations, based on fair tests, which provide data to support explanations or design solutions.

- Plan and conduct an investigation collaboratively to produce data to serve as the basis for evidence to answer a question. (2-LS2-1)
- Make observations (firsthand or from media) to collect data which can be used to make comparisons. (2-LS4-1)

Performance Expectations (Supporting)
